

The weather over the weekend made it challenging for boats heading offshore, but it wasn't bad enough to keep folks at the dock. Offshore water temperatures are in the mid-to-high 70's, hopefully setting up a good marlin bite as we head into the end of August and what has been a historically the time for good marlin fishing.

#### **Poor Girls Open**

We didn't see a lot of action at the scale of the Poor Girls this year, but when we did it was a flurry of activity. The scale was fairly quiet each day until the last hour of weigh-ins when the boats finally got back to the dock.

On Thursday, the first day of the tournament, seas were rough and only 15 boats ventured offshore. Most headed to the Baltimore where several Canyon recorded white marlin releases, including 5 coming on the "Pumpin' Hard 58". A blue marlin was also released on the "Pool Party" while trolling outside the Baltimore Canyon. The only tuna weighed was a 63.2 lb. yellowfin caught on the "Foolish Pleasures" in the

Washington Canyon.

Day 2 of the tournament saw seas mellow a little with most boats heading right back to the Baltimore Canyon. The lady anglers aboard the

"Sushi" weighed a couple of nice wahoo (49.1 & 53.5 lbs.), but unfortunately there wasn't a wahoo division in the tournament this year. Tournament Chairman, Shawn Harman did say that they plan to add a wahoo division to next years lineup. A half dozen nice size dolphin were weighed, including the 25.2 pounder caught on the "Marli", just south of the Baltimore Canyon. The

highlight of the day was the 8 white marlin releases by the anglers on the "Tighten Up" to take over 1st place in the tournament and the 6 white marlin releases that came in from the "Fin-ness". All of the fish were hooked in the Baltimore Canyon.

On the final day of the tournament, 51 of the 96 boats fished with the majority heading back to the Baltimore. "Rhonda's Osprey" was one of the first to arrive at the scale with a 71.6 lb. yellowfin and 4 white marlin releases from the Baltimore. The "Reel Toy" shook up the leaderboard when Nancy Kohl weighed a 34.7 lb. dolphin, caught in the Poor Man's Canyon, to take over 1st place in the Dolphin Division. "Give It Away" was the next boat at the scale with 5 white marlin releases in the Baltimore, but got beat out on the tiebreaker for 3rd place when the "Moore Bills" also recorded 5 releases with their final one coming at 12:56 PM.

Also on the last day of the tournament, Laura Mamberg-Schlote caught and released an estimated 500 lb. blue marlin that was hooked in the Baltimore Canyon.

#### Tuna

Very early in the week we saw a good yellowfin bite in the Wilmington Canyon, but that petered out and turned into hook-ups of white marlin and dolphin for boats that ventured out the following days.

Most of the yellowfins continue to be caught in the Washington Canyon, where on Monday, both the "Marli" and the "Moore Bills" captured 10 yellowfins and where the

"Marli" returned for 2 bigeyes the following day. On Thursday, after the lines were pulled out of the water in the Baltimore Canyon, the "Game On" decided to run down to the bigeye hole in the Washington Canyon where they boated a 249 lb. eyeball at 9:40 PM.

#### **Billfish**

In addition to white marlin being caught and released in the Wilmington Canyon early in the week, and moving south into the Baltimore Canyon heading into the weekend, we also saw blue marlin released every day from Thursday through Sunday by the "Pool Party", "Bar South", "Why Not" and "That's Right". Also on Friday, the "Reel Chaos" returned with a 70 lb. caught swordfish while chunking in the Wilmington Canyon.

#### Dolphin

A lot of dolphin are being caught right now and not only by boats trolling the canyons. With water temperatures in the mid-to-upper 70's, mahi are

being hooked up as close as 5 miles off the beach. The larger dolphin were caught in the Poor Man's, Baltimore and Washington Canyons.

#### Flounder

Flounder fishing in the bay was pretty slow during the week but improved over the especially weekend, Sunday during the incoming tide for anglers drifting around the Rt. 50 Bridge, in the Fishbowl and in the West Channel. The vast majority of fish were too short to keep, but there were some keepers mixed in and the bite was fast and furious with boats hooking 40+ flatties.

Watch over the next several weeks as these fish begin to stage around the Rt. 50 Bridge and in the Ocean City Inlet before their migration offshore.

The best flounder action continues to come from ocean reefs and wrecks. Anglers fishing at Fenwick Shoal, the African Queen and at the Bass Grounds are routinely coming back with double-digit catches

including fish measuring up to 26-inches.

Cut bait is producing the best right now with strips of bluefish and dolphin belly leading the way.

#### In the Surf

We are seeing the typical summer activity in the surf with kingfish, croaker, flounder, sharks and skates dominating the action.

#### **Upcoming Tournament**

When this issue comes out on Wednesday, we will be halfway through the 2014 MidAtlantic tournament. Historically, the final day weigh-ins on Friday at Sunset Marina are very exciting, so make your plans to head on over. The scales are open from 5:00 PM to 9:00 PM.

This Saturday is the 3rd Annual M.S.S.A. Beach N' Boat Tournament with weigh-ins at Ake Marine. This has turned into a really nice flounder tournament with over \$4,000 going to the winning flounder last year. For more information, call 410-255-5535.

# DRIFTIN' EASY



"I heard there's some bluefish in the surf!"



As the season moves towards September we see more and more bluefish in the surf. These guys are not large, but they are fun to catch. Plus, a fat 12 to 14-inch bluefish is very good to eat!

All summer long, anglers are fishing with bloodworms, Fishbites and little strips of squid or other cut bait. The blues will take the cut bait, but usually are not interested in bloodworm or Fishbite bloodworm. One of their favorite baits in the surf is finger mullet!

Finger mullet are baitfish about 5 or 6-inches long that are packed and frozen in

packages of a dozen. There are three ways you can fish with finger mullet. If you are good with a fillet knife, you can fillet off the sides of the finger mullet and attach them to a medium-sized, high/low type surf rig. This will also attract flounder or sea trout. However, blues are not big on presentation, so the filleting is not really necessary. You can take the mullet and cut it into one-inch chunks, discarding the head and tail. anglers like to leave the tail on.) Hook the mullet chunk once through the dark, back section so it stays on the hook. The smaller size of the Sea Striker bluefish rigs work well for this. They call them DT34 and DT34S. The S signifies wire. I personally prefer the made with monofilament because it does

not kink up after fishing for a day like the wire does. Rarely does a snapper blue bite through the stryofoam float and long shank hook and bite off the monofilament. If you lose a hook this time of year, it's probably due to a shark "bite off."



The most popular and effective way to fish for blues in the surf is with a mullet rig! A mullet rig lets you fish the finger mullet whole. You do not need to cut the finger mullet at all. The finger mullet rig is made with a float, a leader, a three-way swivel, a snap for your sinker, a steel rod to run through the body of the finger mullet and a detachable double hook. What you do is run the rod in the mullet's mouth and out its anal cavity and attach the hook back on. The hook naturally tucks into the mullet's anal cavity so only the two prongs of the hook stick out of the mullet's body.

Cast the rig out with a 3 to 5-ounce pyramid sinker attached to the duel lock snap. You can put it in the sand spike and watch the tip of your rod or you can hold the rod and wait for a bite. I like to fish with a light rod this time of year, in the 8 to 9-foot range, and hold my rod. When I feel a bite, I jerk the rod tip and reel in a little to see if I hooked the bluefish. If not, I leave it for a minute then

start to "ever so slowly" bump it back in towards shore. The blues will follow and nip at the mullet, so keeping it moving gives you a better chance to hook them.

"What if the mullet is bit half off?"

Throw it back out and continue to fish with it. No need to change it until there is only a head left. Snapper blues are generally pretty aggressive and will continue to hit the rig as long as there is some meat left on the mullet. You will know when you quit getting bites! Then it's time to put on a new finger mullet.

The other neat thing about fishing with a whole finger mullet this time of year is that flounder will also grab this bait. Flounder are often close in, feeding right on the drop off going into the surf. They are usually there when the water is clean and relatively calm. The casting and slow bumping in with the finger mullet rig works well for flounder. Some anglers cut the surf float off when fishing for flounder, but you do have to keep your bait moving or the crabs will chew off your bait. Hint: If there's one flounder, there's generally more and if there's one bluefish, there's generally a lot more!

There's one very important thing to note when buying finger mullet rigs. The little double hooks can easily fall off or get bent when fishing for blues. The bluefish can make a quick turn and pull off the hook. The hook can get lost

#### Driftin' Easy, cont'd.

when the blue starts to wiggle while taking off the hook. It's always a good idea to buy extra hooks. They are relatively inexpensive and come in several different sizes from #1/0 to #4/0. This time of year we suggest using #1/0 or #2/0. We charge a quarter for an extra hook in our stores. When you lose the hook, the rig is useless, so always buy a couple extra hooks!

"What else will take a whole mullet on a mullet rig?"

Rays, sharks, puppy drum and flounder. For kingfish and croaker you need to fish a second rod with smaller hooks and bloodworm or Fishbites along with a little strip of box squid or other cut bait. Adding cut bait to your kingfish rig will let you know if there are other fish out there such as bluefish or flounder. Plus, kingfish often like a little piece of meat on their hook along with a bloodworm bait this time of year.

"The bluefish are tiny!" Even though you are

fishing with a six-inch finger mullet, you can catch a seveninch bluefish! If you are fishing extremely close to the beach, the bluefish might be running tiny there so try casting out to deeper water. Also, wait for the tide to change and the blues may increase in size. Another nice thing to know is that a light, easterly breeze will bring in bigger blues. So will a falling barometer and some cloudy weather. The old saying that fish bite like heck right before a storm is often true. A flat ocean, with a westerly breeze usually sees slower fishing and smaller blues.

Fishing is fishing and some days are better than others. You know what they say. A bad day of fishing is better than... OK, we won't tell your boss!

I start the report this week with the sad news of the passing of Albert "Buzz" Adams, Jr. Buzz, the father of Hook'em & Cook'em owner, Bert Adams, passed away last Thursday, August 14th after a long illness. He was well known in the fishing community, having owned several headboats and charter boats, including the "Capt. Bob", "Judy V" and "Capt. Bob II". Buzz retired in 2007, but could still be found helping out from time to time at Hook'em & Cook'em. condolences go out to the entire Adams' family.

Morris Joe at Lewes Harbour Marina said currents in the Delaware Bay continued to run hard, even after the recent full moon waned, and most anglers seeking flounder headed for the ocean to find better drift conditions. Inshore Reef Sites 9 and 10 produced flatfish, and Site 11 outside the shipping lane yielded fluke too. Bottom structure of the Old Grounds between "DB" and "DA" Buoys also held plenty of flounder. Ocean water has been very clean and in the low to mid

Because of the water quality, flounder fishermen encountered fish normally found offshore. Marc Levinrad was bucktailing for flounder on the Old Grounds when a nice dolphin swam up to the boat. Marc pitched it a jig, and the mahi pounced on it. He landed the

11.5 pounder, and added it to his limit of fluke weighing up to 4.5 pounds for a mixed bag of fine eating. James Summers was drifting the Old Grounds on the "Martha Marie", when a 12.6 pound dolphin grabbed his flounder rig as he wound it up from the bottom.

Good numbers of flounder were brought in during the week, and many were nice sized. Wayne Demarco decked an 8 pound doormat that ate a bucktail and cut bait combo on the Old Grounds. Bert Long landed a 6.1 pound fluke aboard the "Miss Kirstin". Geoff Klopp and Mason Newsham had flatties of 5.1, 5.95 and 5.96 pounds as part of their limit from Site 10. Chris Vann usually works the deck as mate aboard the "Katydid", but he took off Saturday to celebrate his birthday by fishing aboard the boat with a bunch of his buddies. Captain Brent ran the boys to Site 11 for the party, and the flounder were quite cooperative. The guys put a 40 fish limit in the box, and headed

back to the dock early. Bucktails tipped with Gulp! and smelts were responsible for the demise of many of those flatties. Ron Mistretta muscled in the largest, a citation slab weighing 7.33 pounds. Most were quality fish, and just the 5 heaviest totaled 27.5 pounds. Captain Brian worked the Old Grounds Sunday aboard the "Lil' Angler II", and put together a 16 fish limit for his four flukers. Captain Brent was at it again Sunday, positioning "Katydid" over productive ocean bottom. Regular anglers aboard landed their 40 flounder limit, then topped off the catch with 14 knothead sea bass and an equal number of chunky ling. Fred Robinson had big fish honors for his 7.88 pound lunker fluke.

Back in the Delaware Bay, croakers remained plentiful around the reef sites. Kingfish, spot, puffers, spike trout and triggerfish mingled with hardheads. Bottom bouncers encountered a few surprise species. Vice Zagroba got a 5.75 pound spadefish at Site 7 on the "Indian". Jack Sullivan landed a 12 pound black drum that took a small piece of clam on a croaker rig at Site 8 aboard the "Katydid".

Snapper bluefish have been showing in the rip outside the northern end of the Outer Wall. Their presence is often indicated by diving birds working on baitfish forced to the surface by the ravenous little choppers. A bucktail or small metal jig cast among the feeding blues usually got bit in short order.

Croakers and jumbo spot were abundant in Lewes Canal and Broadkill River. Slot sized stripers and an occasional red

drum were caught as well. Brian Smith was casting an Electric Chicken Bass Assassin along the bank of Broadkill River and connected with a pair of beautiful speckled trout weighing 3.5 and 5.4 pounds.

Capt. Bert Adams at Hook'em & Cook'em Tackle Shop in the Indian River Marina reported slow action in the Indian River Inlet and back bays. Anglers were able to catch small bluefish on Sunday morning and the croaker bite was a little better in the afternoon, but nothing to really rave about.

Most of the action out of Indian River is happening around the inshore shoals, as close as 5-miles off the beach. Those fishing at Fenwick Shoal are finding good numbers of small bluefish and keeper flounder. The "Miss Ene II" ventured out on Saturday and returned with their limit of bluefish, 30 lbs. of flounder, a Spanish mackerel and a sea bass.

The flounder bite on ocean structure is incredible right now, but you need the right drift to make it happen. The areas around "DA" and "DB" Buoys

along with Sites 10, 11 and down to Fenwick Shoal are all spots where anglers are really whooping on flounder. Bucktails tipped with strips of bluefish or flounder belly are really producing.

The headboats out of Indian River are having some excellent days for flounder fishing, but again, it depends on the current. They are also beginning to find larger croaker, in the 12-inch range, along with all the bluefish you want.

Further offshore, mahi and wahoo are outnumbering tuna right now and with warm water temperatures, anglers are surprised finding mahi closer to shore than normal. Bert did report a 19.9 lb. blueline tile fish caught by an angler on Saturday. That is a huge blueline tilefish, and unfortunately, the fish was already filleted before a picture could be snapped.

Off the beach, surfcasters are finding the typical summer selection of a few kingfish, croaker, small bluefish, sharks and skates.

A bunch of years ago, a friend of mine hooked an estimated 350-pound make on 16-pound test line. At the time the world record for a mako shark on that class tackle was somewhere in the 200 to 300 lb. range and the three of us aboard the boat that day knew that if the angler could hold up long enough to actually go the distance with the shark that there would surely be a lot more than just a story of a big fish to talk about at the end of the day.

So the fight went on, for hour, after hour, after hour, and in process it seemed as though we chased the shark with the boat from one end of the ocean to the other, and when it was finally over, the by-then exhausted angler had fought the fish standing-up and without assistance for a total of 11-hours, and yes, he was glad it was over!

The outcome of the fight? Let's not get ahead of ourselves. Before I get into "the rest of the story" let me say that the whole episode began the same way I've seen so many other long-term battles get started - with an angler who was just cocky enough to claim that he was willing, even eager, to go one-on-one with a fish for many hours if that's what it's going to take to land it.

I remember as a kid being just brash enough to make the same kind of statement about wanting to fight a fish for a long time. I thought it would be "fun" and I was just "bad enough" to do it. That

was until the day I did five and a half hours on an 80pound class rod afternoon, only to lose the fish at the boat. Not exactly the fastest learner in the class, a year later I did a rematch with a similar fish, only this time it was six-hours and I actually won the match. The fish wasn't so happy about the ordeal, but I managed to return home with a state record catch and newfound knowledge that no matter what the outcome, it's sometimes better to watch someone else catch a fish than to be the one doing the pulling and cranking.

Now that I'm in the charter business, I don't have to worry about being the guy on the boat tasked with the job of sweating over a fishing rod for multiple hours. That's my clientele's job. Mine is to drive the boat and let them strain their arms and break their backs on fish that they are probably going to release

www.coastalfisherman.net anyway. Amazingly enough, I actually have a lot of repeat clients who keep coming back year after year for more of the same type punishment. They get off the boat all tired, beat up, arms hanging limp at their sides, squawking chiropractors and wondering if they'll be any good at work the next day. Then, of all things, they pay me for the providing them the experience and often put down a deposit for next year!

None of this "pay for pain" makes any more sense now than it did 28-years ago when I got into this business, but as long as people keep asking to go fishing I guess I'll keep taking their money and doing my best to provide offshore experiences that include sore muscles and blistered hands. I'm even thinking that some day I'll offer a special, half-price deal where instead of going out on the water we just line

everyone up on the dock under a hot mid-day sun and I spend an hour or two whacking their arms and backs with a baseball bat. The end results for them should be much the same, but they won't have to pack a lunch for the day and I'll save a lot of fuel. Seems like a win-win for both of us!

Which all brings me back to that marathon battle with the potential world record mako. After 11-hours it was finished, and my buddy pried his left hand from the foregrip of the rod, slumped down into a boat seat and with a great sigh of relief blurted out, "I'm just glad that it's over!" And it was, because after all that time the line finally parted and the shark was gone! Too tired and too sore to worry about a fish he didn't catch or a record he didn't set, my friend spent the next couple days recovering from his day of "fishing." Three days later I get a call from him, "Hey Mark when can we go fishing again? I want a rematch with that fish." And I thought I was a slow learner!

# STP TO STORE STURYE WATER FOR THE STREET OF THE STREET O

Those who follow this column know the topics often follow a seasonal trend or a popular trend. This week, we will discuss a popular topic, LED lighting. Just about every day I review, repair or replace a light of some type aboard a boat. While we discussed underwater lighting here a few weeks ago, this time we will discuss other LED marine lighting.

A light-emitting diode is an electronic semiconductor that converts the applied voltage to light. Most of the LED lighting work I do is retrofit, that is to install a new LED fixture or bulb in of existing place an halogen incandescent or fixture. There are projects were a customer wants to add lighting in an area, which often requires cutting holes, adding wiring and breakers/fuses for new circuits. A retrofit project can be as simple as replacing the existing bulb with an LED bulb or as complicated as adding transformers, cutting larger holes or covering up old holes and selecting the proper new LED fixture for

the task.

Why use LED lighting on your boat? LED lighting uses about a quarter of the power needed for a traditional light, making a retrofit easy since the wiring will most likely have the capacity for your new lights. LED lights give off less heat, a great benefit in the summertime. The LED bulbs are often rated to last 50,000 hours (or about 5.7 years), therefore offering a good value. Many LED fixtures are often totally sealed and water resistant resulting in no maintenance of the bulb and or contacts. While I have seen my share of LED lights that have had issues, the majority work well in their intended application.

#### **Replacement Bulbs**

A quick and easy way to upgrade to LED lighting is to existing remove the conventional bulb from your fixture and install a new LED bulb. While this is simple in a home, it is not always so easy on the boat. For those boaters who find the proper replacement LED's, the results are often surprisingly good, bringing new life to an old fixture. To be sure you get the correct LED bulb, check the voltage of the existing fixture. Most interior lights are low voltage, 12 or 24 volts, but they can be DC (battery powered) or AC (household power). While the DC lighting is more popular, there are a lot of boats with 24 volt AC lights. Older Viking boats are one example. One captain recently found out his lighting was 24 volts AC and replaced all the original transformers with new transformers that output 24 Volts DC, which allowed him a wide variety of replacement LED bulbs to choose from. This conversion also allows him to install new fixtures if desired, using the existing wiring throughout the boat.

One company, Dr. LED in Seattle, Washington provides innovative solutions, specializing in bulb retrofits to the marine and other industries. Another company, IMTRA, located in New Bedford, Massachusetts also offers replacement LED bulbs and also has a entire range of LED lighting just for boats. IMTRA's director of lighting sales recently visited Ocean City to see and learn more about the fishing side of boating, walking the docks and visiting boats during the White Marlin Open. This company supplies many boat builders with products and your existing lighting may be an IMTRA product.

# Replacement Fixtures

Maybe you have decided

you want to replace the existing fixture. If so, there are many LED options to choose from. LED lights are often offered in many colors, such as cool white, warm white, blue, red multicolor, color changing, dimming, etc. For basic interior lighting, most people select warm white or cool white based on their personal preference. The warm white color is consistent with traditional lighting and may better match the look of other interior lights The cool white is a slightly bluer light and appears brighter to some people. Cool white is a popular color for exterior lighting. There are also many other colors available alone or combined in one fixture. For example, the Lumitec Orbit light is available with white, red, blue and purple lights in one fixture, allowing the light to use any one of these four colors as selected by the switch. Lumitec manufactures many indoor and outdoor marine lights, all made in the USA.

Many LED fixtures operate on a wide range of input voltage. The Lumitec Orbit, mentioned previously, is rated from 10 volts DC to 30 volts DC, allowing the same fixture to be used in many applications. Most marine LED manufacturers have lights that operate on both popular voltages of 12 and 24 DC.

Many LED fixtures are dimmable, though not all, so if you need a dimmable fixture,

please read the specifications carefully. Often, the same fixture is offered in many configurations, colors, voltages dimming and capability. The common way to dim a fixture or group of fixtures is with a common dimmer switch. This may need to be upgraded to a digital dimmer for some LED's to function properly, so please check with the manufacture to see if yours is compatible. A relatively new innovation for LED fixtures is a dimming feature designed into the fixture itself. This allows you to use a standard on/off switch to control the brightness, using a quick flip of the switch to hold the light in it's current brightness while it ramps up to full brightness. This innovative control is also used to select the color of the light, when properly equipped. These two features make retrofitting a new fixture easy, since the exiting wiring and switching can be used to activate these modern features.

Weather you choose a new LED bulb or a new LED fixture, LED lighting offers many benefits and can be enjoyed for years to come.





As summer presses on, many favorite species are available along the Mid-Atlantic coast, with notable catches coming mostly from the inshore fishing scene. As for the weather, we continue to watch to our South for tropical developments as the hurricane season runs its course.

Cobia jumped to the top of the inshore fishing list, with some really big fish cruising waters lately. oceanfront got the nod last week, as sightcasters scored with plenty of fish as they group into pods. Many of these cobia were pushing to well over 50-pounds. Choose your bait carefully, as these fish are often finicky this time of year due to the high fishing pressure. A few die-hard chummers are also still finding some decent fish along the

lower Chesapeake Bay shoals.

Big red drum continue to provide late summer topwater opportunities, as schools of drum continue to roam near the entrance of the Chesapeake Bay and near the northern end of the Chesapeake Bay Bridge Tunnel (CBBT). Scattered sightings of jack crevalle also came from these same areas last week. Red drum are also a common by-catch for anglers targeting other species such as cobia and flounder, from the Bluefish Rock area out to the Virginia Beach oceanfront.

Interest in black drum is still low as the fish circle the islands of the CBBT, and they will be moving out soon.

The summer flounder bite is pretty much as good as it gets right now. Solid flatfish action is providing limits for anglers, with many fish measuring in the 20 to 23-inch range or larger. Several doormats are also responding, with 7 to 10-pounders not uncommon. The best catches continue to come from the 3rd and 4th Island areas of the CBBT, with live baiting and jigging working well for anglers along structure and over inshore wrecks and reefs. Some drifters are also having luck with keepers found along lower Bay channels, drop-offs, and near Buoys 36A, 42, and the Cell, as well as the seaside inlets along the Eastern Shore. Both the Lynnhaven and Rudee Inlets continued to provide decent catches of keeper fish last week. Offshore wrecks are also starting to become more productive.

Sheepshead anglers are still enjoying good catches of big fish on fiddlers, with some fish ranging up to around 13-pounds. More sheepshead are beginning to move onto the tubes of the CBBT, along with lots of big triggerfish. Spadefish are still around, but they are preparing to leave the area soon.

Along oceanfront waters, trollers are still enticing large Spanish mackerel from Cape Henry to Sandbridge, with catches also coming from throughout the lower Bay. Small gold and silver spoons are the best lures for these fish. Scattered king mackerel sightings, along with a few hook-ups, confirm that these fish have arrived. The large abundance of ribbonfish showing along the coastlines lately could make for a good king season.

Shark fishing is still good in these same areas, but check the regulations. A few encounters with bailer mahi within a few miles of shore are surprising anglers targeting inshore species lately.

Croaker are still keeping pace within lower Bay waters

and inlets, with some decentsized fish to be found. The bite out of Oyster is also filling coolers of nice hardheads from the deeper parts of the channel.

Nice spot moved into lower Bay waters recently, with anglers intercepting yellowbellied spot off Ocean View and from Lynnhaven, Rudee and Little Creek Inlets.

The puppy drum action is still going strong within most shallow water locations, with solid action happening within Lynnhaven, Little Creek, and Rudee Inlets.

Speckled trout action is starting to pick up in many of the same locations, with the nicer trout found on the Poquoson Flats, Back River, and the Bayside and seaside creeks and inlets on the Eastern Shore. A few nice grey trout along with some sea mullet are also responding near the High-Rise of the CBBT, as well as off the Bayside areas of the Eastern Shore.

Tarpon are still active in the backwaters of Oyster, but not

for much longer. Amberjack are available at the South Tower and some of the offshore wrecks, and jack crevalle will likely make a brief showing at the Chesapeake Light Tower soon. Deep droppers are still faring well as boats continue to find a variety of nice tilefish, rosefish, barrelfish, and grouper along the edges of the Canyon.

As the billfish population builds offshore, boats are returning with varied catches. Several white marlin, along with scattered sailfish, spearfish, and blue marlin were released recently. The best catches of billfish continue to occur with live baiting techniques. Nice gaffer dolphin and wahoo are also adding some variety, along with scattered big yellowfin tuna and an occasional big eye tuna.
