

all the teams competing in the tournament, including several Ocean City boats. Outside of the tournament, there is still great fishing happening off of North Carolina with consistent catches of yellowfin, mahi, wahoo, blue marlin, and tilefish. With any warm water eddies remaining more than 100 miles from our inlets it will more than likely be a few weeks until we have a shot at most pelagic species. Luckily the colder water as they are one of the few fish species that regulate their own body temperatures. This means that there is a chance that bluefins are swimming around some of the inshore lumps or in the canyons waiting to be discovered. With the opening day of black sea bass this Thursday, an influx of boats in the ocean just may come across some of these cool water tunas. The lack of offshore targets shouldn't keep everyone at the dock! The Eastern Shore is full of productive fishing right now, from flounders in the back bays, rockfish

and bluefish around the bridges and jetties, as well as both black and red drum migrating through the bays and rivers. For those with boats too large to maneuver around inshore, there are starting to be some more ocean options as well. Aside from the upcoming sea bass opener, there are a few days left in the spring tog season as well. An inshore wreck trip is a great way to break in the boat for the season and ensure everything is running smoothly before making the 50+ mile run to the canyons soon. If you really want to stretch your legs a bit and make a longer run, the ole reliable tilefish can be a tasty option as Mr. Bluefin can tolerate its season opens as well, offering a solid backup plan for action if you're unable to find any bluefins. This is also the time to go through your gear and make sure everything is functioning after a long winter of collecting dust in the garage. Theres nothing worse than tackle failure while fighting a fish so take the time now to set your drags, re-spool your reels with fresh line and re-rig with clean leaders. A few hours of preparation now can save you from heartbreak this summer. All of our local tackle shops are fully stocked with everything you may





need to be sure your tackle arsenal has what it needs to be successful this season. Now is also a great time to hop on the phone and call one of the local marinas to get hooked up with a date on a charter boat, if you wait until you're seeing tunas on the dock to call you may be too late! Skip out on getting Dad another neck tie for Father's Day and get him what he really wants, a day fishing with (or maybe without) his family. Hopefully within the next few reports there will be some offshore activity from our own waters, but until then we will settle for daydreaming about it while keeping busy in preparation and maintaining an eye on both the reports and the warm water coming out of the south.



It was a nice surprise to get this picture from Hook'em & Cook'em at the Indian River Marina. Jesse Coulbourn, Dave Wade, Drew Henninger and Pat Miles (not pictured) headed offshore and boated a ton of golden and blueline tilefish. Jesse's golden was 36 lbs. and Dave reeled up a massive 51.6 lb. one that was just shy of the Delaware state record. Their 7 goldens and limit of bluelines were caught on whole squid and jigs.

Scott hooked this animal up using sand fleas and Fishbites clam on a hi-lo circle hook rig. It's obvious from the photo that Scott is at least mildly enthused by his catch.

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OCEAN CITY FISHING REPORT by Capt. BJ Pietryak

This past week, in Maryland,, gave us another big week for surf fishermen on Assateague Island. Several big rockfish as well as black drum, were pulled out of the surf. The inlets and back bays are coming alive with flounder and tog are being found along the rock walls and near the inlets. Tog are slow on the nearshore wrecks, however with sea bass opening on the 15th of May, the nearshore report should get a lot more interesting.

Back Bays and Inlets

The back bays and inlets continue to improve as the water warms up. Flounder are being taken more readily from the channels as well as some showing up on the flats. Tog

and bluefish are on the rocks at the inlet, along with rockfish at the Rt. 50 and Rt. 90 bridges. Craig Cropper took the boat out, to the Rt. 50 Bridge, and landed a few small rockfish using his famous Roy Rig.

Tom Scibek had 2 customers from Maryland fishing floater rigs with live minnows. The duo landed a few flounder including two keepers. Rich Fiore fished the inlet and landed a few small rockfish on artificials.

Although "no keepers" he stated, what a blast on light tackle. Josh Valliant fished the Thorofare Thursday morning and appeared to be perfectly dialed in to the fish catching a limit of flounder for his boat and crew. Brian

Reynolds found the tog at the inlet ready to bite. He landed several pregnant ones which were returned, but did manage to find a nice 18" and an 181/2" one. Brian also hooked a bluefish and small striper. Scott Rohrbaugh went out for 3 hrs. and managed to find 7 rockfish willing to bite despite the high winds. No fish fell within the slot and all were released unharmed. Matt White was fishing the south end of Assateague Island when he got his only bite of the day. The medium size rockfish measured 33 inches and was safely released after an epic battle. Funny how one bite can make even a slow day seem like a great one! Corey Glover fished the south Jetty, on an incoming tide, and landed and released a 38 inch rockfish. The fish fell victim to the infamous Roy Rig. Brian Blackney had a good week on the bay landing several flounder and even taking four keepers home for dinner. Brian Marine and son found their first keeper fluke of the year. Thomas Cline also found his first flatfish keeper of the year last week landing a nice 18" fish in the back bay. Jeff Messick and James Cathell also did a little bay fishing and landed their first keepers of the year. Dillon Scopp landed the first speckled trout of the year along with a nice 31" black drum.

Nearshore Wrecks and Reefs

Sea bass season starts on May 15th. The regulations this year are 13 inches and 15 keepers per person. Many anglers looking forward to the start are gearing up and getting ready for the fish. When rigging up for bass a top and bottom rig is the most common rig to use, tipped with clam or squid. Due to the popularity of sea bass fishing,

many spots are loaded with boats causing the fish to be shy about striking baits. This leads many seasoned anglers to use a small 1 or 2 oz jig on a spinning rod with ten pound line. The lighter line allows the lure to get down the 60 ft. needed to reach the bottom. If using a high low rig, make sure you are using fresh clam or squid to assure the best attractant for fish to attack. Tog are also being caught on the wrecks with lots of shorts and a few keepers. Double Trouble Charters' Captain DJ Churchill stated the bite has been pretty good lately, with many anglers limiting out. He advised anglers to follow his advice and release the big spawning females. John Coffiey was on the "Fish Bound Charters" and he and crew landed limits of tog, releasing several big females full of eggs.

Surf Fishing

Surf fishing has been on fire on Assateague Island. Several large black drum along with over slot rockfish have been taken from the beach. Ron Loeffler was using sand fleas and an 8 oz. weight and landed a nice black drum Ronald Marquez checked big ugly off his bucket list. The big fish took a fresh clam sand flea combo. Kristen D'Amore Benk fished at the MD/VA line when he landed his drum on sand fleas. Parker Steele found a couple fish willing to bite his offering fishing the island last Tuesday. Ian Hinman got it done using a 7/0 circle hook on a high low rig while fishing a falling tide with cut sooks. Dylan Fogle and Daniel Hubbard had another successful trip landing 2 black drum. The fish came on an incoming tide and the second was at a slack high tide. Connie Alderfer caught a nice drum while fishing the beach with cracked crab. (His sons were more excited than he was!) Chris Jenkins stated, "he had one day to make it happen" and



he scored. The big black drum was successfully reeled to the beach and invited home. Billie Thomas had a good trip last Sunday bringing in his second drum of the year. Jimmy Sands stated "it was tough to let the big 36" striper go", but safely released the over slot fish. The fish was caught using a high low rig tipped with sand fleas. Yusof Amireh was fishing with his two sons on the north side of Assateague Island when they hooked into and landed an over slot rockfish. Sean McNelis finally landed his first ever black drum. The fish was hooked 20 minutes after setting his lines. Great job Sean! Dennis Kaler had a pretty good day on the beach landing both a rockfish and shark while soaking sand fleas on a high low rig. Both fish were released unharmed. Alessandra Calcara and son had a beautiful day on the beach, which was made even better by catching a 26 lb drum. Chris Taylaor fished 4

days in a row. The first day he caught one and lost one. Day 2 his friend Georgie caught one and lost 2. Day 3 Chris caught one. The 4th day they fished all morning and had to wait till late afternoon before catching the final one. These guys really seem to have drum fishing dialed in. Great job guys! Ben Witmer and wife Charlene fished the beach on Friday afternoon. Charlene was able to land her first ever black drum 5 minutes after their setting up. The couple ended up with a total of 3 fish before dark. That's one hell of an afternoon fishing! Steve Wenn was also out Friday and landed one drum, one stingray, and 10 skates (not too shabby). These fish will soon be moving into the DE Bay to spawn and then leaving for cooler water way up north. So you have maybe two more weeks before these big uglies are gone till September.



brought us a strong west wind causing low blow out style tides in the back bay and dirty nearshore waters. Fishing is continuing to improve as the water warms and fish begin to return to the area after the cold winter months. The back bays and inlets are producing a lot more fish than in previous weeks with rockfish, blues and now even a few trout being found along the rocks in the evening on the higher tides. Tog are venturing closer to the beach and can be found on most wrecks now along with a couple of flounder. Sea bass season will open on Thursday May 15th and should see waters in an agreeable range for a good harvest much to the delight of anglers. Black drum are still being caught along the beach as well as the big breeders being found on the DE Bay shoals.

Back Bays and Inlets

The back bays and inlets are improving daily with big bluefish and stripers being found along the rocks of Indian River Inlet each night,

This past week in Delaware hungry to strike a paddle tail or cut bait tossed by eager anglers. Flounder still appear to be in deeper water but are beginning to show up more regularly. The Delaware Bay is one of the biggest breeding areas for the black drum and has began to show the big cows moving in to begin their breeding ritual for the year. Large females between 50 and 80 pounds are on the shoals near the mouth of the bay. Fresh surf clams, sand fleas, and fish bite strips in crab or clam flavors are the best baits for targeting these huge fish. A simple fish finder rig with a sliding 6-8 oz sinker and 40 pound mono leader tipped with a 6/0 hook is the best rig for targeting these spawning fish. A few fresh clams can be dropped into the water to draw the fish close and then the main bait on hook can be placed behind the boat resting on the bottom. If you have never caught a trophy black, be aware the larger fish over 50 pounds do contain a worm parasite which becomes more prevalent as the fish The parasite is a grows.

natural occurrence and is not harmful to fish or humans, however many anglers lose their desire upon seeing the worms while fileting the fish. Iamie Watson checked into Lewes Harbour Marina with a big 52 pound Black drum he caught using fresh clams in the bay. 'Master Sportfishing' said the drum are booming in the bay and several clients have brought in fish over 50 pounds. The big uglies will only be here for a short time so get out soon to capitalize on the action. Charlie Keller also got in on the breeding bay action landing a nice 25 pound black on clam and sand fleas. Fenwick Tackle had Jim Thompson checking in with a 40" rockfish (released), as well as a 28" black drum which he invited home for dinner. Sand fleas tipped with fish bites (sand flea flavored) did the trick for both fish. Lex Hons fished the bay and caught a couple big drum on clams. On the outer wall of the bay Zac Johnson caught a limit of tog with several shorts. Trevor and Terry each got a nice drum from the bay weighing 42 and

Back at the south pocket of Indian River Inlet, TJ Mull caught a nice slammer bluefish on a cut mullet. The fish was checked in at Old Inlet Tackle. Jose Luis Aparicio got his first keeper flounder off the rocks at IR Inlet. The nice 17.5 inch fish fell to a white gulp. Tony Walls was fishing the slack tide along the rocks at the inlet and hauled in a 17 " tog. Tod Furster stated the guy down from him pulled in a 20" one. Dave Evens and group fished the back bays of IR and landed 2 keeper flounder along with 2 keeper tog.

Up In Lewes Canal Brian Blackney had a good week landing 4 keeper flounder along with several shorts. Rich Morgan fished off the docks of the canal and landed a huge early season 24 inch, 5 pound 11 oz fluke using a minnow rig. The canal also provided Jay Shinn with 3 keepers and a few more shorts. Matthew Soen housed 2 nice fish in the ice box along with a few throwbacks. Squid /minnow combos are taking most of the keeper flatfish from the canal. EI Turner pulled in the first weakfish I've seen this year. The fat fish was full of eggs and safely released. Jim Hichens weighed in the first weakfish at 2.41 lbs.



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Nearshore Wrecks and Reefs

Nearshore fishing is still slow with sea bass season not opening till the 15th, however Jay Shinn did manage 3 keeper fluke this past week. Young Finley Cleveland caught a 19", 2.2 lb flounder fishing just outside of IR Inlet. Matt Brough caught a limit of tog on structure but returned the females to spawn, looking to save the big breeders for the fall. 'Bad Wind Charters' used their clacker rigs to land a limit of fish from ocean structure. Although not easy, the crew persevered and got the job done.

Surf Fishing

Surf fishing is producing several large black drum as well as over slot rockfish on both clams as well as sand fleas. Keith Liller fished the drive on and landed a big over slot rockfish last Thursday eve. Mike Mikalonis landed a 47" black off Fenwick beach on sand fleas. Jo Jo fished the Cape Henlopen Pier with mullet and shrimp, landing a big bluefish. Ben Fisher finally got his first drum of the year using fresh clams. Ted Proseus went 2-3 on big bluefish while fishing the Fenwick beach last Wednesday.

Clams and Crabs

As the water warms, the clams are being found closer to the water of their sandy homes. Many anglers are finding clams just below the sandy bottom and easy to rake up. Crabbing remains fairly slow with an average of 5-7 keepers per pot or around 25 crabs per 4 pots. I have found that each pot contains between 25-35 crabs per pot with most being juvenile crabs or egg bearing Probably one or females. two sheds from now and all the crabs will reach mature keeper size. Bunker is still the preferred bait.

Sip with Confidence: A Guide to Testing Your Drinking Water

It is becoming increasingly common for Sportfish boat owners to rely on their freshwater systems for drinking water. While traditionally, many boaters opted for bottled water, this can be costly, consume valuable storage space, and generate a significant amount of waste.

The advancements in water makers and secondary freshwater reverse osmosis processing systems like Spot Zero have given most captains and crew confidence in the cleanliness of the water entering their storage tanks. However, the integrity of these systems can be compromised if tanks and plumbing are not properly

maintained or are susceptible to contamination, particularly during periods of inactivity in the off-season or extended stays in tropical environments.

I recently experienced this firsthand while working with a captain in Costa Rica who was encountering water pressure issues on a large Sportfish boat. By tracing the plumbing lines, we located the primary filter, and upon removal by the captain, he was astonished (visibly sickened) by the extensive biological growth. He had been drinking the tap water, unaware of the contamination that had developed after the boat sat idle for a few months.

It was clear that a simple filter change would not suffice; the entire system required decontamination due to growth



within the lines and clogging aerators. This involved a lengthy and repeated cleaning process, following guidelines from organizations like the United States EPA or the World Health Organization for potable water systems. The captain mentioned above indicated that he had successfully used a two-step water system cleaner made by Thetford for this purpose.


If you have a water tank with clear water that you simply want to make sure it is safe to drink or use for human contact (hand washing, laundry, etc.), then you can follow the protocol for emergency disinfection of drinking water. In that case, the correct ratio of bleach is 1 teaspoon Clorox® or another brand Disinfecting Bleach per 7 gallons of water (or for a smaller size container, 4 drops per quart). Stir the bleach into the water and let stand for 30 minutes. Properly treated water should have a slight chlorine odor – if not, repeat the dosage and let stand an additional 15 minutes.

To clean out a dirty water tank, thoroughly flush the tank using

you will need to clean a tank, here is one example: to make approximately 9 gallons of bleach solution, then you would start with 9 gallons of water, and then add 1 cup bleach. After flushing the tank with the 500ppm bleach solution for 5 minutes, then rinse with a 10ppm bleach solution (1 teaspoon bleach per 10 gallons of water). You can get some chlorine test strips to confirm the bleach concentration of the solutions you mix up. These can usually be found at pool supply stores.

With the prevalence freshwater RO systems like Spot Zero, many boats now have small electronic testers (\$25) to measure TDS (total dissolved solids), which are crucial for identifying minerals that can cause water spots. However, it is important to note that TDS measurements alone do not indicate drinking water quality, other essential aspects of drinking water, such as the presence of chlorine, alkalinity, pH, or, most importantly, bacteria.

While processing water through an RO system can



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remove most minerals, chemicals and bacteria may still be present. UV lights are often integrated into treatment systems to eliminate bacteria, but these are typically installed before the freshwater tank. Consequently, any bacteria that develop within the tank or lines after this point can still proliferate.

Fortunately, a variety of DIY on-board water testing systems are available, with basic options including test strips like those used for pools. These kits fall into two categories: testing for minerals, pH, etc., and others

that specifically detect bacteria, including E. coli, which is a contaminant from sewage and not removed by reverse osmosis.

Bacterial test kits cost approximately \$15 per test and require up to 24 hours for results to develop, while more comprehensive chemical/ mineral kits cost about \$1 per test with immediate results. If your boat's freshwater system is used for drinking, cooking, and bathing, regular water testing is highly recommended to ensure acceptable water quality and safeguard your health.

Baked Flounder with Parmesan Crumbs

Ingredients:

4 flounder fillets (2 pounds total)

3/4 cup freshly grated Parmesan cheese

1/2 cup coarse fresh bread crumbs

4 tablespoons unsalted butter, melted

grated Directions:

Preheat the oven to 425°F. In a large baking dish, season the fish fillets with salt and pepper.

Pan Seared Striped Bass

Ingredients:

8 ounce striped bass (2 fillets)

1 tablespoon flour Use glutenfree all purpose flour if needed.

Pinch of salt, pepper

- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 2 tablespoons butter, divided
- 1 lemon, juiced
- 1 tablespoon capers

Small handful fresh herbs, such as fresh rosemary, chives, or oregano

Directions:

Pat bass fillets dry. Dust with flour, and shake off any excess. Sprinkle them on both sides with salt and pepper.

Prepare a heavy pan with the olive oil and 1 tablespoon butter. Heat on medium-high until butter is melted but not browned, then turn the heat down to medium.

Place the fillets skin-side down in the pan and cook about 4 minutes. (If your fillets don't have skin, it doesn't matter which side you cook first.)

Don't touch the fillets until they're ready to flip.

Use a thin metal spatula to test the fish. If you can slide the spatula under the fish without the fish sticking to the pan, it's ready to flip. If the fillets won't release, give them another 30 seconds. They'll release when they've finished cooking.

After flipping, divide the remaining 1 tablespoon butter over both fillets.

Cook fish another 2-3 minutes until done. (Thicker fillets will take longer than thin fillets.) Fish will be golden on both the



top and bottom and opaque all the way through when finished cooking.

Transfer the fish to plates, leaving the excess butter in the pan. Cover fish to keep warm, or set fish in a 200°F oven.

Reduce heat to medium. Add the lemon juice and capers, and stir with a wooden spoon. Add half the herbs and stir again.

Serve fish hot with pan sauce and remaining herbs.

Lobster Mac and Cheese

Ingredients:

6 small fresh lobster tails (1 1/2 pounds total)

8 tablespoons (4 ounces) unsalted butter, divided, plus more for greasing baking dish

1 small (5 ounces) yellow onion, sliced (3/4 cup)

3 cloves garlic, sliced

1 (6-inch) thyme sprig, plus thyme leaves for garnish

1 cup dry white wine

2 cups whole milk

1 cup heavy whipping cream

2 (6-inch) tarragon sprigs, plus tarragon leaves for garnish

1 pound uncooked short curly pasta (such as cavatappi or campanelle) 1/3 cup (about 1 1/2 ounces) all-purpose flour

12 ounces fontina cheese grated (about 3 cups)

6 ounces Gruyère cheese, grated (about 1 1/2 cups)

8 ounces mascarpone cheese

1 ½ teaspoons soy sauce

1/2 teaspoon black pepper

1/2 teaspoon ground mustard

1/8 teaspoon ground nutmeg

3/4 cup panko (Japanese-style breadcrumbs)

1 ounce Parmesan cheese, grated (about 1/4 cup)

1 teaspoon grated lemon zest (from 1 lemon)

1/2 teaspoon paprika

Directions:

Grease a 3-quart, 13- x 9-inch baking dish with butter; set aside. Bring a large pot of salted water to a boil over medium-high. Add lobster tails; cook, undisturbed, until shells turn red but meat is still slightly translucent, about 2 minutes (lobster should be undercooked). Using tongs, transfer lobster to a large bowl; let cool 5 minutes. Transfer 2 cups of the cooking water to a heatproof measuring cup and set aside; reserve remaining water in pot on stovetop. Using kitchen shears, and working over the bowl to catch any juices, cut down the center of each lobster tail shell, transfer meat to a cutting board, and add shells to bowl. Remove and discard digestive tract from the lobster tails. Chop lobster meat into 1-inch pieces and place in a medium bowl; cover and refrigerate.

Melt 2 tablespoons of the butter in a large saucepan over medium-high. Add reserved lobster shells with any juices from bowl; cook, stirring often, until aromatic, about 2 minutes. Add onion, garlic, and thyme sprig; cook, stirring often, until onion is soft and translucent, about 3 minutes. Add wine; cook, stirring often, until almost dry, about 6




minutes. Stir in reserved 2 cups cooking water in measuring glass, and bring to a simmer over medium. Simmer, stirring occasionally, until reduced by half, about 15 minutes. Stir in milk, cream, and tarragon sprigs; cook over mediumlow, stirring occasionally, 10 minutes. Remove from heat. Pour through a fine mesh strainer into a large heatproof bowl; discard solids. There should be about 4 cups lobster stock; set aside. Wipe saucepan

clean; set aside. Preheat oven to 400°F.

While lobster stock reduces, return remaining lobster cooking water in large pot to a boil over high. Add pasta and cook for 1 minute less than package instructions for slightly less than al dente. Drain and set aside.

Melt 4 tablespoons of the butter in cleaned saucepan over medium until foamy. Whisk in flour; cook, whisking



constantly, until bubbly and light golden brown, about 2 minutes. Gradually whisk in reserved 4 cups strained milk mixture. Cook, whisking often, until thickened, 6 to 8 minutes. Remove from heat; gradually whisk in fontina and Gruyère, whisking until melted. Add mascarpone and whisk until smooth. Stir in soy sauce, pepper, mustard, and nutmeg. Gently stir in cooked pasta and lobster meat. Spoon mixture into prepared baking dish; set aside.

Microwave remaining tablespoons butter medium-size microwavable bowl on HIGH until melted, about 30 seconds. Stir in panko, Parmesan, lemon zest, and paprika. Sprinkle evenly over mac and cheese mixture in baking dish. Bake in preheated oven until bubbly and light golden on top, about 20 minutes. Remove from oven; let stand 10 minutes. Garnish with thyme leaves and tarragon leaves and serve.

Quick & Easy Crab Pasta

Ingredients:

1/2 lbs linguine, spaghetti or pasta of your choice

3 tbsp unsalted butter

2 cloves garlic

1/3 cup dry white wine

1/2 lemon, juice only

1 cup ready to eat crab meat

1/2 cup finely grated fresh parmesan cheese, not pregrated cheese

2 tbsp chopped parsley

Salt and pepper to taste

Directions:

Cook the linguine in a large pot of salted, boiling water according to package instructions.

Five minutes before the pasta is ready, set a large pan over low heat and melt the butter, add sliced garlic and sauté for 1 minute over very low heat without coloring it, then pour



in white wine and lemon juice, turn the heat up to medium and let it reduce for a couple of minutes.

Stir in the cooked crab meat and take it off the heat. Drain the pasta once cooked and reserve ½ cup of pasta water. Add the pasta to the pan with the crab meat and toss to combine, add half of the reserved of pasta water and freshly grated Parmesan cheese, stir over low heat until the cheese melts and coats the pasta. If the pasta is a bit dry, add a splash of pasta water. Your pasta dish should be loose but not swimming in sauce, just lightly coated. Salt to taste. Sprinkle with fresh parsley before serving.

Flounder in Jalapeno Cream

Ingredients:

2 scallions, white parts only, chopped

1 tablespoon unsalted butter

1 -2 tablespoon jalapeno, chopped (including seeds)

1/2 cup heavy cream

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/8 teaspoon black pepper

1/2 cup grape tomatoes, quartered

1 tablespoon cilantro

Directions:

In a large skillet over medium heat cook the scallions in the butter until softened (3-5 minutes). Add jalapeno, cream and 1/4 teaspoon salt and bring to a simmer.

Pat fish dry then sprinkle with pepper and remaining salt (1/4 teaspoon).

Fold each fillet in half crosswise and place in sauce and cook at a simmer until fish is cooked through (5-10 minutes). Transfer fish to a platter and keep warm.

Add tomatoes and cilantro to sauce in skillet and cook over medium low heat until heated through (1 minute).

Spoon sauce over fish and serve.

10 Minute Honey Garlic Shrimp

Ingredients:

1 lbs shrimp, peeled and deveined

1 tbsp light soy sauce

1 tbsp cornstarch

2 tbsp vegetable oil

3-4 cloves garlic

1 tbsp ginger paste or grated ginger

4 tbsp honey

1/4 tsp chili flakes, optional

2 green onions, for garnish

Directions:

In a medium bowl combine the soy sauce and cornstarch, then add the shrimp and toss to combine. Set aside till needed. (This method is called "velveting" in Chinese cooking and is used to protect delicate meat like shrimp and chicken from drying out during cooking.)



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Heat the oil in a non-stick frying pan and cook minced garlic with ginger for no longer than 30 seconds over medium heat, then add the shrimp and cook for 1-2 minutes on each side depending on the size of the shrimp.

Pour in honey and chili flakes if using, toss to coat the shrimp and take off the heat. Sprinkle with sliced green onions for garnish. Serve over rice or as a starter.

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

FISHING REPORT by Capt. Matt Abell

April showers bring May "FLOUNDERS"... or something like that. Some warm weather and more conducive conditions have led to a "BLOOM" of Eastern Shore fishing that is sure to bring smiles to fishermen, followed by forkfuls of flavorful fillets. It doesn't matter if you are searching for a seaside trophy or bursting for a bayside beast, all you have to do is cast a line for some "REEL" eastern shore action.

The flounder action is off the hook... or maybe on the hook would be a better use of words. The water temperature has crept up allowing for decent fishing on both tides. The most important environmental component for a successful seaside excursion is finding waters with low turbidity. Clean conditions are necessary to bring these sight

feeding predators to the side of the boat. To aid in making baits more visible and tempting, rigs sporting jigs, teasers and spinners like the Sea Hawk flounder ring or Deadly Tackles "Deadly Double" help get your line tight. The rigs can be enhanced with strips of squid, or gulp swimming mullet curltails and tipped with silversides and big bull minnows. The best colors have been a mix of white, chartreuse and pink (pink has been a little better for us). Bites have been most concentrated in 2' to 12' depths in the seaside bays of the VA Barrier Islands from Wachapreague to Chincoteague. While there has been an abundance of short fish, there have been plenty of keepers with some trophy fish mixed in. Definitely some fantastic floundering fun.

The middle Chesapeake has


kept a quick tempo thanks to the beating of huge black and red drum. The big blacks have engaged in battle with anglers on some of the many oyster rocks of the Tangier and Pocomoke sounds in depths of 12-25 feet of water. These bar-baled black bullies have taken chunks of peeler crabs deployed on 6/0-8/0 circle hooks with fish finders. The shallows have produced REEL good red bites on similar rigs with soft crab or peeler fished along the edges of grassy flats and stump beds. In addition to some trophy bronzed bulls, there has also been some catch and release rocking and the first of this years speckled trout in the same areas and on the same baits.

The southern bay has continued to offer good black and red drumming. Anglers have bottom fished the blacks in typical spring time stops like Latimer Shoals and the Cabbage Patch with clams. Elsewhere, reds have been battled to the boat around the shoals of Smith or Fisherman's as well as the CBBT where shoals of big bronze bulls have been spotted.

The suds have been the scene of spots and stripes as a mix of reds, blacks and rock have been wrestled through the whitewater. Sand fleas and peelers have been the pull to attract these big beasts for a real test of pullage with surf anglers.

This week we give thanks to the Mothers who keep our families together and make it possible to enjoy our passions. Grab that special lady, hook up the boat and give her the best Mother's Day present ever...Take her fishing. What else could our beautiful ladies possibly want to do to enjoy this wonderful place we call home!

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




