

On the first day of the 31st Annual Ocean City Shark Tournament, the crew on the "Nontypical" arrived at the Ocean City Fishing Center with a 224 lb. make shark and held on to win the Make Division in the 3-day tournament. Angler Jim Hughes of Ocean City, MD hooked the winning fish on a tuna fillet in 50 fathoms in the Poor Man's Canyon. Jim was fishing with Jimmy Fields, Tim McGuire and Capt. Terry Layton. The team also won 1st place in the Release Division with 38 points and top honors in the Dolphin Division for a 32 pounder caught in the Washington Canyon. Capt. Terry Layton was named "Sharker of the Year" for the crew's combined performance in the Make Mania and Ocean City Shark Tournaments. Their total tournament winnings over the weekend were \$31,988.



#### Shortfin Mako Shark Isurus Oxyrinchus

#### Key Distinguishing Markings:

- Teeth are long and slender with smooth edged cusps, and are visible even when the mouth is closed.
- · Distinct countershading dorsally blue and ventrally white.
- Moderately short pectoral fins.

#### Sign

 The shortfin make grows to an averate length of 6' - 10' 6" and to a weight of approximately 130 - 880 lbs.

#### Distribution:

 The shortfin make inhabits offshore temperate and tropical seas worldwide.

#### Food Preference:

- Primary prey includes mackerel, tuna, bonito and swordfish, but it may also eat other sharks, porpoises, sea turtles and sea birds.
- Shortfin makos consume 3% of its weight each day and takes about 1.5 2 days to digest an average-sized meal.

#### Spawning:


• The shortfin make gives birth to live young. Developing embryos feed on unfertilized eggs in uterus during the 15 - 18 month gestation period. The surviving young are born live in late winter and early sprint at a length of about 28".

#### Fun Facts:

- Of all recorded attempts to keep pelagic shark species in captivity, the shortfin make has fared the poorest; the current record is held by a specimen that, in 2001, was kept at the New Jersey Aquarium for only five days.
- Makos swim below their prey, so they can see what is above and have a high probability of reaching prey before it notices.







# Ocean City Fishing Report

It was another incredible week of fishing in Ocean City. Although shark and sea bass fishing hasn't lived up to expectations, tuna fishing has more than made up for it. There has also been plenty of action in the bay for anglers searching for flatties and stripers, although catching a keeper flounder is still a challenge.

Here's what we saw...

#### **Shark Tournament**

Warm water temperatures continued to haunt local shark tournaments. In last week's Ocean City Shark Tournament, only 3 makos were weighed and no blue sharks or threshers ever saw the scale. Large bluefish were also scarce.

The "Nontypical" was the big winner with a 224 lb. mako shark that took 1st place in the Mako Division. The fish was caught in 76-degree water in the Poor Man's Canyon. They also won the Release Division with 38 points resulting from 1 dusky, 4 tiger sharks and 5 makos released. Overall, there were 100 sharks released during the 3-day tournament (13 makos, 2 blue sharks, 46 sandbar or dusky, 16 hammerheads, 10 tiger sharks and 13 spinner sharks).

The Bluefish Division was won by the "Teaser" with a

whopping 2.7 lb. snapper caught near "B" Buoy on the final day of the tournament.

The Dolphin Division was also won on the final day when Tim McGuire on the "Nontypical" boated a 32 pounder in the Washington Canyon.

James Kirk on the "Tuna Box" landed a 43 lb. bluefin at the Jackspot on the last day of the tournament to win the Tuna Division.

It was no surprise to anyone at the awards banquet when Capt. Terry Layton on the "Nontypical" was named Sharker of the Year for his teams combined performance in the Mako Mania and Ocean City Shark Tournaments. They weighed 2 makos in the tournaments (120 lbs. & 224 lbs.) and accumulated 1,100 release points during their 4 days of fishing.

#### Yellowfin Tuna

Although the warmer offshore water temperatures (72-

76 degrees) put a damper on those chasing sharks, it certainly has produced some of the best yellowfin tuna fishing we have seen in quite some time. Action was strong throughout the week starting on Monday when the "Marli" and the "Moore Bills" returned with double digit catches. The "Marli" boxed 24 that day, closely followed by 21 on the "Moore Bills".

On Tuesday, "That's Right" returned from the Wilmington Canyon with 11 yellowfins in the box.

Thursday saw some tremendous action in the Baltimore Canyon with the "Moore Bills" catching another 24 yellowfins. The "Marli" (18), "Foolish Pleasures" (12), "Dawg Haus" (12) and "That's Right" (10) also recorded double digit catches.

On Saturday, the "Marli" smoked them again with 24 yellowfins in the box, all caught between the Baltimore and Wilmington Canyons. The "Fish Bonz" also ventured to the same area and ended their day with 10 in the box.

Sunday saw a sporadic bite where some boats were able to hook up to 9 yellowfins, while others had trouble getting any action.

#### **Bluefin Tuna**

Those anglers not interested in making the longer trip to the canyons were able to find big schools of bluefin tuna along the 20-fathom line. Heck, even the headboat, "Morning Star" was able to troll one up on Sunday.

The big news last week in regard to bluefin tuna was the potential world record set by Alan Elenson on the "Paige V". Alan enjoys going after bluefin world records, and before Wednesday's catch, already had 3 on the books. After heading

out, just west of the Hambone, Alan was able to hook a 22.5 lb. bluefin on 4 lb. test line, breaking the previous line-class record of 16 lbs. 11 oz. set in 1992.

Elsewhere, anglers recorded solid catches while trolling near the Jackspot, Hambone and Chicken Bone. On Sunday, the "Restless Lady" released 30 bluefins, keeping 2, including a 110 pounder. Capt. Todd reported that the inshore lumps are loaded with bait and the fish are stuffed with sand eels.

#### Dolphin

Larger dolphin are hitting the docks, caught by anglers primarily trolling for tuna. The dolphin caught by Tim McGuire in the Washington Canyon on Saturday was the heaviest mahi we have seen so far this year, tipping the scales at 32 lbs.

#### Billfish

Boats looking for yellowfin tuna recorded white marlin releases throughout the week. On Monday, the "Moore Bills" released 3 whites in 70 fathoms in the Wilmington. Thursday was a good day when the "Marli" released 2 white marlin, also in the Wilmington, the "Osprey" released 2 in the Baltimore and "That's Right" broke off a blue marlin in the Poor Man's. On Sunday, "Reel Fantasy" released 2 whites in the Baltimore where "Pullin Tidal" also recorded a release.

#### Bluefish

We usually see the larger, chopper bluefish coming from anglers fishing the inshore lumps, but it seems with the warmer ocean water the larger fish are more easily found in the bay around the Rt. 50 Bridge. We saw a couple of fish caught last week that measured over 30-inches. Those fishing with Gotcha plugs pulled in the big fish.

#### Flounder

Early in the week, bay anglers continued to hit the flounder hard, primarily in the bay behind Assateague. When the water was clear, and the wind wasn't fighting the tide, good numbers of fish were caught. Later in the week, the bite shifted to the flats, north of the Thorofare.

Anglers had to be patient when looking for a fish to take

home since the throwback/keeper ratio is still running high. A good example of this occurred on Wednesday, when fishermen on the "Bay Bee" brought back 9 keepers and recorded over 130 throwbacks during their two trips.

Although the keepers seem to average 19-20 inches, a junior angler on the "Get Sum" was able to pull a 24-incher out of the bay on Wednesday behind Castaway's Campground.

The best baits to use are no secret. Shiners, minnows and definitely the Gulp! Swimming Mullet are the top producers. If you use the Gulp! artificial bait, pink and white are the hot colors.

#### Sheepshead

On Saturday, Michael Guigley caught the heaviest sheepshead of the year, a 13 pounder, while fishing with clams at the South Jetty.

#### **Striped Bass**

The incredible striper bite we saw in previous weeks seemed to thaw a little as the week progressed. Early in the week, anglers on "Skip's Charter & Guide Service" pulled 6 keepers from the rocks during a late afternoon trip. They also recorded 50 throwbacks, all while fishing with live spot. After that, a few fish were reported by anglers fishing with live bait around the Rt. 50 Bridge and also across the tip of the South Jetty.

#### Sea Bass & Cod

We continue to see catches of sea bass and cod come off the headboats heading offshore to reefs and wrecks. The cod bite this year has been remarkable, with more fish caught than in the last 10 years combined. On Thursday, a junior angler aboard the "Morning Star" landed a beautiful codfish weighing 6 lbs. 8 oz. Anglers are doing well using clams for bait when looking to hook either sea bass or cod.

#### In the Surf

Sue Foster at Oyster Bay Tackle reports, "Big stripers are basically gone from the surf. It was a great run, and you can always catch one, but it's very "hit or miss." The only thing big in the surf now are sharks and big rays. Small fish, such as kingfish, croaker, small trout, and sand perch are hitting in the surf right now. These fish are biting FishBite Bloodworms, real bloodworms, cut bunker and little pieces of surf clam. Combination baits are great such as FishBites and a little strip of fresh bunker, frozen mullet or box squid. "

#### **Tournaments**

There are 2 tournaments this weekend, both with weigh-ins at Sunset Marina.


The MSSA Tuna-Ment will begin on Friday and end on Sunday. Weigh-ins are each day from 4:30 pm to 7:00 pm. This tournament stretches down the coast, with boats fishing out of Wachapreague and Chincoteague competing with those sailing out of Ocean City.

The Ocean City Marlin Club Small Boat Tournament will be held on Saturday and Sunday with weigh-ins from 3:00 pm to 6:30 pm.



# **Driftin' Easy**

I had a fellow in my store the other day and we got talking about flounder fishing. He and I both agreed that we catch more flounder using a rod holder than when we are holding the rod. The fun part about rod holders is that you can fish more than one rod! If you are drifting along with two rods in the rod holders that are fairly close together, fish one rod in close to the boat with 4ounces on it. Cast another rod out further with 2 or 3ounces on it and they won't tangle, even if the boat takes a turn.

If you fish a rod in a rod holder you can't ignore it. Continuously monitor the tips of the rods for any sign of a flounder "pick up." Sometimes the flounder just jiggles the rod a little. Sometimes flounder the slowly pulls the rod down, not unlike a large crab holding onto your squid bait!

When fishing a rod in a rod holder for flounder, a light action rod is not a bad idea. The boat drifts along and the angler can watch the

tip moving up and down over mussel beds and other rough bottom. This motion going over rough bottom can get your squid or gulp mullets jiggling as the sinker moves over the rough bottom, enticing the flounder to bite! Personally, I like an 8-17 pound test rod for overall flounder fishing, but sometimes it's fun to play around with a light 6-12 pound test rod!

If you are drifting pretty fast, don't wait too long to grab the rod when a flounder may be on it. Flounder don't have hands, and they can let go as fast as they grab on. If you know a flounder was on it and let it go, try dropping back to it for 2 or 3 minutes. But if the fish does not come back, pull your rig up and check the bait.

If you are fishing with live bait such as minnows, be sure to keep lively minnows on the hooks. If they are half dead or cut by a flounder, take them off and put on fresh ones. Pick out the larger minnows. Make sure there is no grass or dirt on your rig,

and really important, if your "cut bait" (squid or cut fish strips) gets dirty, pull it off and change it. Capt. Monty Hawkins on the "Morning Star" believes in this and so does my husband, and they are both right!

If you are in a boat and the tide goes slack, try bumping the motor in and out of gear to do a slow troll, or pull one of your rods in and cast and retrieve slowly with one until the tide gets moving again. Then you can put ol' Rodney back to work!

When you are fishing, "Rodney" is the sand spike.

Besides keeping your reel from falling in the sand when baiting up or taking off a fish, Rodney is there for you to help set the hook. Again, just because a rod is in a rod holder, don't ignore it and expect it to do all the work. It's just a piece of plastic or metal and doesn't have a mind of its own. But it is like another pair of hands. You have to be the "eyes"! Sometimes anglers jerk the rod and try to set the hook too soon. That's what is great about Rodney. You can stand back and watch the tip (or tie on one of those silly sets of bells if you are really not paying attention). When the rod tip goes down, you can jump up and grab the rod and start reeling the fish in.

Rodney can be twins! You can fish two or even three rods at a time. But now you really have to pay attention. Sometimes I get worn out running back and forth between rods and go back to fishing one rod when the fish really start biting!

The most important thing to do when fishing a rod in a sand spike is to set your drag correctly. Do not leave it on "terminate" (cranked down as tight as you can make it). If a big fish comes along like a shark or a huge ray, your whole rod and reel can be

dragged into the ocean to never be seen again! Pull on your line coming from your reel when your bail is closed and you should be able to pull off line. Anglers with bait feeder reels can set their reels in free spool with some extra tension on the bait feeder controls. This works really well in the sand spikes. Then, once the angler grabs the rod and starts cranking, the bait feeder is off and the fish can be cranked in normally.

troll Anglers who offshore always use Rodney (rod holders). Anyone who fishes offshore knows that vou have to be attentive to the rods that are in the rod holder. If a fish grabs hold and then gets off, all good anglers know to "drop back" to the fish. Since you are moving at a pretty good pace when trolling, it's important to do it fast and right away!

Clear the lines! Whether you are trolling or surf fishing, if someone gets a really nice big fish on, reel in the other lines that are in the water. You don't want to lose a fish because it gets tangled in another line.

Always be attentive and always know where your lines are in the water. When drifting, water depths change and as they do, you need to either crank in some line or let out some line. Good anglers are always doing something with their rods. Even when they are in the rod holders, baits are sinkers checked, changed, grass is picked off and new baits are put on. 

2 portobello mushrooms

2 TBSP. olive oil

1 garlic clove, minced

6 oz. crabmeat

5 tsp. mayonnaise

2 roasted sweet red pepper halves, drained

In a shallow dish, add flour.

Dredge fillets in flour, shaking off excess.

In a large skillet, heat 1 TBSP. butter over medium-high heat.

Remove fillets from skillet; keep warm.

Repeat procedure with 1 TBSP. butter and remaining 2 fillets, remove and keep warm.

Add shallots and garlic to skillet, sauté 4 minutes or until golden brown.

To make the sauce, stir the chicken broth, capers and remaining 1/8 tsp. salt in with the shallots and garlic; cook 2 minutes.

Remove from heat; stir in lemon juice, parsley and remaining 2 TBSP. butter.

2 lbs. bluefish fillets

1 cup milk

1 cup Panko bread crumbs

1/4 cup butter

1/2 tsp. oregano

1/2 tsp. garlic powder

1/2 TBSP. salt

Shredded cheddar cheese

Preheat oven to 500 degrees. Place bread crumbs in a dish; add oregano, garlic powder and salt and mix well.

# **Delaware Fishing Report**

by Rick Willman



Hi folks!!!! Fishing in the back bays seems to be improving a bit compared to the last few weeks. Flounder are being caught on both the incoming and outgoing tides. A few more fish are being found in some of the deeper holes throughout the bays. Massey's Ditch has been a pretty good producer the past week or so.

Wyatt Smith used a minnow to trick a 20-inch flattie that weighed in at 2 lbs. 10 oz. Seven-year-old Jamie Scott gave the big guys a lesson when he landed his 4 fish limit while fishing aboard the "I Have Fishuses" with Capt. Tom Scott. The largest of Jamie's keepers was 20-inches, and he also used minnows.

Michele Lombardo landed a 2 lb. 2 oz. flattie, and Charline





Jim Semerteen of Dagsboro, DE was trolling a ballyhoo/sea witch combination along the 40 fathom line when he hooked this 17.3 lb. dolphin. Weighed at Hook'em & Cook'em.

Logan caught a 3 lb. 5 oz. flounder. Rick Melvin fooled two flounder, weighing 3 lbs. 15 oz. and 2 lbs. 12 oz. Don Ruth scored a 4 lb. 3 oz. fish, and Phyllis Dinger fooled both a 3 lb. and a 4 lb. 6 oz. flattie.

George Wilder leads the way in the Rehoboth Shores Tournament with a 7 lb. 9 oz. flounder. Bob Jones caught a 2 lb. 4 oz. fish to get on the score sheet. Richard Dinger caught a 2 lb. 8 oz. fish for his score.

Offshore action has been good for those making the long haul. Gill Waddington and his sons Cory and Dan have been putting their friends on the fish. Their boat, "Another Bill", has been scoring yellowfin, bluefin, dolphin and white marlin.

Capt. John King of Lititz, PA took Dave Tkatch and his sons Chris and Colin to the Hambone aboard the "Dolci Vita". The boys released 2 dusky sharks in the 150 lb. range and 1 dusky over 200 lbs. They also released 2 bluefin tuna.

Hook'em & Cook'em reported a 9 lb. 3 oz. flounder that was weighed in by angler Mike Esham last Friday. Mike hooked the doormat while drifting live shiners in the Indian River Inlet.

The news from Bill's Sport Shop was that Skip Mosiej called to report a Sunday trip offshore to Massey's Canyon where they caught 6 bluefish, 2 false albacore, released one bluefin tuna and kept one weighing 50 lbs. All were caught trolling ballyhoo and lures. Stu Moore of Harrisburg, PA sent us an email that read, "Guys, thanks for the shark gear, we were out in the nice blue water for 30 minutes and came tight on a make for the grill. We had the second one hit 30 minutes later; it was a big fish, but we had our one fish. Good bite, but the water is getting warm fast."

Tom Wise stopped in with 3 keeper flounder up to 4 lbs. caught in the Rehoboth Bay. "High Hook Charters" out of the Indian River Marina reported: "We fished this weekend west of the Wilmington and went 12 for 15 on yellowfin, keeping 9 fish in the 30-45 lb. range, then came inside and landed an 88 lb. bluefin."

Steve, Cody and Austin

Shirk from Grantville, PA spent the night on the south side of the Indian River Inlet and came away with 5 stripers up to 21.65 lbs. and 39-inches on Calcutta Flash Foils. Bill Weiss and his neighbor, Joe, fished the north beach with fresh bunker and wound up with a nice king and 9 throwback croakers. Bucktail Bob, a contestant in Bill's Sport Shop flounder tournament, brought in his limit of flounder. They weighed 6.7 and 6.3 lbs., which would have beat the winners. Unfortunately, he did not weigh them in until 7 pm, well after the close of tournament.

Stanley Mumford Millsboro, DE caught a 17.95 lb., 39-inch striper in the Inlet on a Gulp! eel. Bill Baker Jr. caught a keeper flounder at Massey's Ditch with chartreuse Gulp! on a spec rig. Captain Chris Thurmon of "Skipjack Charters" reported a flounder trip to "B" buoy, catching lots of flounder with 5 keepers. On another trip, he went to the Canyons where he boated 8 yellowfin and one mako. Bill Vernon fished on the "Four Play" on Sunday in the Wilmington. They caught three yellowfin, the biggest weighing 86 lbs., and they lost a blue marlin after a short fight. All fish were caught on ballyhoo in 70 fathoms.

Ioe Morris at Lewes Harbour Marina said offshore tuna action was very good, with crews reporting nice catches of both yellowfins and bluefins. Jim Short and the guys aboard the "Knot Right" arrived at the 100-fathom line between the Baltimore and Wilmington Canyons sunrise on Saturday and found packs of hungry tuna feeding aggressively. They put out a mixed spread of ballyhoo and artificials, and it wasn't long before they were into a series of multiple hookups. The bite continued through morning, and before long, the fishermen were on their way back to the dock with a limit of 18 yellowfins ranging up to 60 lbs. Ed Sigda and the boys on

the "Snow Goose" got into the tuna on Saturday also. They scored 5 yellowfins between the Baltimore and Wilmington Canyons. Several boats had good catches in that area during the week. The "Skipjack" overnighted in the Wilmington and returned with a mako and 8 yellowfins. Bill Swords and his buddies on the "Swords Fish" mixed it up on Wednesday by putting 3 yellowfins and 3 gaffer dolphin in the box, then topping it off with a nice batch of tilefish. Numbers of billfish have been present in warm water in the Canyons as well. Angelo Delapo on the "Spoiled III" told of going two for five on white marlin while working 81-degree water in 250 fathoms below the tip of the Wilmington. The whites pounced on green machines and spreader bars being pulled for tuna. Andy and Chuck Shelton released a pair of whites in the Wilmington Saturday. Bluefins were hanging out in twenty

fathoms. The Hambone was productive for trollers towing cedar plugs and spreader bars.

On the inshore scene, bottom bouncers found fluke on the Old Grounds between "DB" and "DA" Buoys. With favorable drift conditions, anglers using bucktail jigs tipped with strip baits caught good numbers of flatties. Flukers on the "Katy Did" had 9 keepers and many just short, drifting southeast of "DB" on Saturday. In the Delaware Bay, flounder catches were pretty good before the full moon, but fell considerably off with strong currents and dirty water following the lunar phase. Last Sunday, anglers on the "Katy Did" fished Reef Site 5 in Broadkill Slough and ended up with 10 keepers out of 57 caught. Mark Adams got the season's first sheepshead on that trip, a 5.45 pounder. Flounder continue to come from the Lewes Canal. John Davis checked in a 4.75 lb. flatfish he fooled with a white Gulp!. Folks at the rails of the

Cape Henlopen Pier caught a few keeper fluke, along with some spot and small croakers. Boaters drifting along the Outer Wall and Ice Breakers in the evenings and after dark hooked into stripers. Casting bucktails, Storm Shads, Bombers, Rat-L-Traps or eels was effective. Small boat fishermen had fun in the Lewes Canal tossing topwater poppers for stripers. The marsh banks between the Freeman Highway Bridge and Gordon's Pond yielded plenty of strikes. Rick Bortz was in on the last hoorah for black drum this spring. He and a buddy had four from 25 to 40 lbs. at the end of flood tide, while anchored and baiting with clams on the Coral Beds Tuesday night.



## Ship To Shore

#### **EPIRB & GPIRB UNITS -**YOUR SAFETY LINK IN A **BAD SITUATION**

Hopefully you've never experienced a day offshore when you had to abandon your boat or you were "dead in the water" with no one else in sight. If you have, then you know how bad that can feel. However, there are a few things that can be a great help if you ever find yourself in that situation.

The survival raft has been around for quite a while but more recent years have given us the device known generally as the Position Indicating Radio Beacon. Earlier models depended on overhead aircraft for relaying information about a vessel in distress. Today's units make use of satellites.

(Emergency The EPIRB Indicating Radio Position

Beacon) is a portable device containing a high power fiveyear shelf life battery that, when activated, provides a distress signal via radio waves which helps rescue personnel locate your position. Each EPIRB has a unique electronic serial number that is transmitted by the unit. For the system to work as designed, it is critical that you send in your registration form to NOAA. This registration identifies the owner, the vessel and the unique serial number of the EPIRB. It also notifies NOAA of those persons you identify as the ones to contact first if your vessel is reporting a distress signal. In addition, you need to update your registration information periodically. This can be done via the Internet at Coast Guard website http://www.sarsat.noaa.gov/b eacon.html.

The signal from the EPIRB is received by satellites and transmitted to Local Terminals on land that decipher the code and match it to the database of names that have been registered. That data is relayed to a Mission Control Center and a Rescue Coordination Center contacted. Local search and rescue forces are alerted and rescue crafts are dispatched to the emergency site. A high intensity xenon strobe light on the unit and a 121.5 MHz radio transmitter aid in the shortrange stages of location. This all happens very quickly.


The most popular EPIRB is the standard size 406 MHZ. This is the EPIRB that the Coast Guard recommends for all offshore mariners. In some cases it is legally required to be used. It transmits on 406.025 MHZ and VHF 121.5 MHZ simultaneously and is accurate to within 3 miles. Search and Rescue Satellite-Aided Tracking (SARSAT) will accurately detect these EPIRBs.

Similar to the EPIRB is a device called the GPIRB (Global Position Indicating Radio Beacon). It is very close in design and purpose to the EPIRB except that it is able to give more precise location information. This accomplished by the addition of a GPS receiver inside the device. When activated, its internal GPS finds its own position, just like an onboard GPS you might already have. Having located


itself, it broadcasts its identity and position on 406MHz. It will then shut down for 20 minutes to conserve power, and repeat the process of locating itself and broadcasting. It will continue to update its position every 20 minutes as long as it is active. Once the information transmitted, the procedure for rescue is the same as with the EPIRB.

Naturally, finding the vessel in distress should be faster with the GPIRB. With both units, some things are critical to remember, however. First and foremost is the importance of registering your unit so that a "hit" from your device will be known to come from your boat. Also, keep in mind that the device is designed to assist the rescuer in finding "it". Therefore, you must have the unit strapped to your boat or your raft or wherever YOU are. It serves little purpose for the rescue team to find the device if you are not with it. Better units are equipped with a hydrostatic float free release that activates itself when subjected to water pressure. Once free from the release bracket, the device will automatically turn itself on when the water sensors get wet. For this to work, the unit must be set to the "ready" or "armed" position. They can, of course, be deployed manually at any time.

The GPIRB units are about the same size as the EPIRB devices but their cost is somewhat higher. Either unit Continued on page 39

will provide an excellent safety measure for you in case of an emergency when time is critical. More recently, manufacturers have made Personal Locator Beacons (PLB). It is smaller than the above units and is designed to be attached to you. It has a built in GPS to give your accurate position. The main drawback is the shorter battery life of 24 hours. Remember that they will direct rescue to the person wearing the PLB. If you are on a boat and more than one person has gone overboard, the one wearing the PLB is the one who will be found.

The PLB's lower price and smaller size is making them quite popular. ACR appears to have the biggest variety of beacons of all types. Their new Aqua Fix PLB is their latest entry into the market.



## **Chum Lines**

Anyone who has fished offshore or paid much attention to what has been caught so far this year has likely realized that it hasn't exactly been a standard season. Much to the delight of local fishermen, billfish, tuna, dolphin, sharks, cobia and a few other species started to bite two or three weeks earlier than usual making it more reminiscent of the first week of July than the middle of June.

sure, but so far this is really shaping up to be a great fishing year. It'll be interesting to see how it all shakes out when we actually hit July, whether or not the fishing will plateau between now and then or maybe just keep on getting better.

There's been a lot of

speculating but not much complaining about the early season action, and while no one can tell for sure what's in store for the rest of the summer, a lot of us have taken note of the offshore conditions that might have brought all this about. First and foremost have heen the water temperatures which, back in early May, started showing signs that they were going to do something special for us this year.

Usually in May, the average temps offshore are struggling to get into the midto-upper 50's. Then sometime during the first week of June they finally hit the 60-degree mark and slowly creep up until about the third week of the month when they hit the 70's. But this year someone turning up the started thermostat a couple weeks early. I was surprised in mid-May when the water was already around 60-degrees but didn't figure the temperatures would keep climbing at the steady pace that they did. Now here we are over the hump of June and we're already looking at water temperatures in the mid-70's. Mother Nature's calendar must be showing her that it's July already!

Besides being unusually warm, most folks who have been out there will probably agree that the offshore waters have been extra clear this spring. I'm not exactly sure of the reason for this and clear


water doesn't always equate to more fish, but I don't think it can hurt and it sure is a confidence builder when you can look down and see your bait 30 or more feet below the surface. But the clarity of water is dependant upon a lot of factors and is something that can literally change overnight. Changes in the current, the wind's strength or direction, a sudden plankton bloom, heavy rains and who knows what else can easily turn crystal water to muck and leave anglers scratching their head wondering what the heck happened. But for the last month the waters from just outside the Ocean City Inlet to as far off as you want to go have been exceptionally pretty and I'm hoping that whatever is making it that way will keep it up all summer.


While clear water and warm temperatures are great, perhaps the most encouraging thing a lot of us have been noticing offshore this season has been the amount of baitfish that have been showing up anywhere from 2-20 miles offshore. I've seen schools and schools of sand eels, menhaden and a lot of other little critters that I have no ideas what they were but I'm sure they're something that big critters would be happy to munch on. Even in the back bays right now there

are plenty of schools of little bunker, again, earlier than usual. You can have the best water conditions in the world, but if you don't have the bait you're not going to have the predators. We've got the bait!

Mention warm, clean water and lots of food and someone might think you are talking about the perfect vacation spot. If things keep going this way I've got a feeling there might just be a whole lot of fish that decide the nearshore waters off Delmarva are just that. It's been a number of vears since the zone 20-30 miles off the beach has been the hot ticket for hooking up to a mix of tuna, dolphin and maybe a marlin or two, but right now the stars seem to be aligning for such a thing to happen. Anglers should also keep an eye on the Jackspot and look for an opportunity to drag a spoon behind a planer across the shoal. This could just be the year when we see a strong return of king mackerel. With fuel prices the way they've been I'm sure I'm not the only one who would fully enjoy the opportunity to spend more time fishing this summer and less time at the pump watching the numbers spin!







## Virginia Fishing Report

Dr. Julie Ball I.G.F.A Representative



The saltwater fishing scene off Virginia continues to improve with each passing day, and with another beautiful weekend on the horizon, many anglers will surely have a good window to get their dads out to try their luck on the water.

Although cobia are peaking many angler's interest, the bite seems to be on the slower side compared to the past few years. Those who chumming are finding the best results. Areas off Hampton, from north of the Rockpile to Buckroe Beach are producing a few decent fish, while Latimer Shoal is also giving up scattered fish in the 60-pound range. Although folks are reporting sightings of cobia on the surface in the lower Bay and near the Bay Bridge Tunnel, the fish have been slow to respond to casters. Although working hard for their catches, most sightcasters are finding that eels are their best bet.

The flounder scene held steady within the lower Bay last week. Keepers are coming from Oyster, off Kiptopeke and near the four islands of the Bay Bridge Tunnel. Anglers are finding luck working jigs and live bait around the pilings and the tubes of the CBBT, as well as drifting strip baits and minnows along drop-offs and channels. The 4th Island was particularly productive last

week. The lower Bay inlets are also producing some keeper flatties. Both drifters and waders are scoring with more consistent catches near the Lesner Bridge in Lynnhaven.

The red drum interest is now mostly overshadowed by other species. The folks at Chris' Bait and Tackle tell that the red drum are still available on the Nine-foot Shoal and along Fisherman's Island, although most are measuring under 40-inches lately. A few nicer fish are still coming from

around the CBBT and large schools of bulls were still cruising on the surface along the coast from Sandbridge to False Cape last week. A few black drum are coming from the four artificial islands of the Bay Bridge Tunnel, where casters are picking away at fish on bucktails as well as crabs, peelers, and sea clams.

Spadefish have been a disappointment for the last few years; so many folks don't even bother fishing for them anymore. Although slow, a few spades were boated at Light Tower last week. Fish weighing up to around 5-pounds are still being caught on clams from the 3rd and 4th Islands of the Chesapeake Bay Bridge Tunnel.

Sheepshead action is on the rise, with nice fish taking offerings all along the bridge's structure and on lower Bay wrecks. Bill Knapp of Virginia Beach and his crew boated a limit of fish up to 12-pounds, 12-ounces while fishing at the CBBT last week.

Spanish mackerel made a good showing along the Virginia Beach coastline last week, with some fish pushing to around 20-inches. Trolled, small Drone and Clark spoons will do the trick on mackerel, along with a mixed bag of tailor bluefish. Small bluefish, croaker and spot are available in both the Rudee Lynnhaven Inlets. Small croaker and tailor bluefish are hitting at the Hampton Roads Bridge Tunnel, while croaker and sea mullet are also biting off Ocean View and around the CBBT. The folks at Ocean's East 2 report that several boats are scoring with big bluefish pushing to over 30-inches just outside of the Little Creek jetties lately.

Nice sea bass are hitting on a few wrecks and structures about 30-miles offshore. Deep droppers working the Canyon edges are also finding some sea bass, along with decent numbers of deep water species, such as blueline tilefish, grouper and barrelfish. Catches of golden tilefish and black bellied rosefish are coming from water deeper than 50-fathoms. Those willing to make the run can find amberjack beginning to school around offshore wrecks and the South Tower.

A few boats made the run offshore to the warmer water near the Triple 0's last week. The "Top Notch", skippered by Captain Russ Kostinas out of the Virginia Beach Fishing Center, had a good day with two white marlin releases, a blue marlin release and a smattering of gaffer dolphin. Most of his action came in 50fathoms of water. Other boats testing out this water also encountered several billfish. An occasional yellowfin tuna or mako shark is also a possibility.

NOAA seeks

Mid-Atlantic fisheries

NOAA proposed procedures for setting annual catch limits and accountability measures to prevent overfishing for 10 federally managed fish stocks managed by the Mid-Atlantic Fishery Management Council.

Once the procedures are final, the Mid-Atlantic Council will be on its way to establishing catch limits and

accountability measures for all its required fisheries. According to the Magnuson-Stevens Act, all federally managed fisheries must be managed with those tools by the end of 2011. Already, NOAA and the eight regional Fishery Management Councils have implemented annual catch limits to prevent overfishing for 203 of the nation's 528 managed marine fish stocks.

"Annual catch limits and measures have been a major part of the successful rebuilding of fish stocks we have seen in this country, and they help ensure populations are being sustainably fished," said Eric Schwaab, assistant NOAA administrator for NOAA's Fisheries Service. "When we have well-managed fisheries, it pays off for fishermen, consumers, coastal communities, and ecosystems."

The proposed amendment applies the fishery management requirements of the Magnuson-Stevens Act and increases the role of science in setting management measures for all of the Mid-Atlantic council's fishery management plans. The council felt that it was more efficient to establish a common set of ground rules for all the management plans at once through an omnibus amendment, rather developing them for each management plan separately.

The Magnuson-Stevens Act, the major law that sets how fisheries will be managed, required that by the end of 2010 fish species experiencing overfishing must be managed with annual catch limits and accountability measures, and expanded that requirement to all federally managed fisheries by the end of 2011. Historically, species in this region have been managed by more indirect controls, such as limits on the number of days vessels could fish and the number of fish that could be caught per trip.

The amendment also includes measures to prevent fishermen from exceeding the catch limits, and addresses how any overages that occur would be handled.

The fish species in the Midaffected by Atlantic this proposed include action Atlantic mackerel, butterfish, Atlantic bluefish, spiny dogfish, summer flounder, scup, black sea bass, tilefish, Atlantic surfclam, and ocean quahog. 





# Straight from the Maryland DNR Fisheries Service

#### It's All Good

Having been fortunate enough to spend many summers growing up at my family's North Ocean City home from the time I was 12, I have my share of memories of good fishing in Ocean City. But as good as any of those memories have been, I don't know if I can recall a past June that has been as good as this one.

Inshore, stripers have been good from the Rt. 50 Bridge and the South Jetty. Summer flounder keepers have been turning up for the inshore charters and private boats, especially in the south bay down by the airport to Frontier Town. The head boats continue to make impressive catches of Atlantic cod, along with black sea bass and tautog on the offshore reefs and wrecks. Biologists from Massachusetts and NOAA continue to work with Captain Monty Hawkins to document the unusual summer catches of cod, including tag mark and recapture information.

Offshore, the pelagic fishery continues to see great action at the canyons for yellowfin tuna, with several blue marlin and a few whites reported as well. Further in at the Chicken Bone, Hambone and along the 20 fathom line, bluefin catches have been decent. Our biologists report that over 90 bluefin had

been checked in (see below for landings requirements) during the time frame May 1 through June 5th. By comparison, only 4 had been checked in for the same time frame last year.

Sharks, particularly blue, hammerheads and some makos are turning up at the Fingers and the Sausages.

Overall, June of 2011 should go down as one of the very best in years.

#### **Tuna Time**

The shift of attention for offshore anglers is now focusing on tuna. This coming weekend marks the first big tournament tuna. The Maryland Saltwater Sportfishermen's Association (MSSA) will be holding their 22nd Annual Tunament Friday, Saturday and Sunday. Weigh-ins will be held at Sunset Marina, along with Chincoteague Wachapreague, VA. Look for the tuna bite to remain solid leading up to the 24th Annual Ocean City Tuna Tournament, July 15-17, with weigh-ins at the Ocean City Fishing Center.

All owners/operators of vessels fishing recreationally for and/or retaining regulated Atlantic Highly Migratory Species (Atlantic tunas, sharks, swordfish and billfish) in the Atlantic Ocean, including the Gulf of Mexico and Caribbean Sea, must obtain an Atlantic

Highly Migratory Species permit. Similar (HMS) Atlantic tunas permits, 2011 Atlantic HMS permits cost \$20.00 and will be valid from the date of issuance through December 31, 2011. Please remember that Maryland vessel owners should report their recreational bluefin tuna, blue marlin, white marlin, roundscale spearfish, sailfish, and swordfish landings at a state-operated reporting station.

Anglers are responsible for completing a catch card when they return to port for each ABT or billfish on board their vessel. A tag is provided for each completed catch card and the angler is required to place this tag around the tail of the fish before removing it from the vessel. Trailered boats cannot be pulled from the water until the tag is in place.

Nine marinas qualify as Recreational ABT/Billfish Reporting Stations. Marinas distribute and collect catch cards, issue tags, and return leftover supplies to MD DNR at the conclusion of the fishing season. In addition to the marinas, an after hours kiosk is available at the MD DNR field office. Anglers that use the kiosk are expected to complete the catch card and the attached receipt, which replaces the tag. The catch card is to be deposited into the locked box at the kiosk. Participating marina's include: Ake Marine, Bahia Marina, Fishermen's Marina, Sunset Marina, Ocean City Fishing Center, Ocean Pines Marina, Pines Point Marina, White Marlin Marina, Talbot Street Pier and Marina and the MD DNR Natural Resources Boat House in West Ocean City next to the Martin Fish Company.


#### Get Ready for Radford

You've been hearing about it for a couple of years. Now it looks like the time is fast

approaching for the sinking of the largest vessel for an artificial reef on the Atlantic Coast, and second largest in North American waters. The USS Radford at 573 feet in length will be second in size only to the USS Oriskany, an aircraft carrier placed off Pensacola, Florida in 2006. The placement of the Radford as an artificial reef off the Delmarva Peninsula will create a giant three-dimensional structure, which will provide habitat for fish and myriad other marine fauna. The location of the final resting place of the Radford is the Deljerseyland reef site. Named because it is located relatively equidistant from the ports of Ocean City, Maryland, Indian River, Delaware and Cape May, New Jersey. The reef site sits approximately 30 nautical miles from each of these ports in 130 feet of water near the existing wreck of the Moonstone. When the vessel goes down, it will provide 70 feet of vertical relief off the ocean

The prospects are promising for drawing a mix of fish species ranging from those with strong affinities for structure such as tautog, black sea bass, cunner and triggerfish to apex predators such as tuna and sharks. The sinking of the Radford also represents an effort demonstrate that large vessels can be prepared and reefed inexpensively and expeditiously. In contrast to other mega vessels like the Hoyt Vandenbergh, which took over 10 years of preparation at a price tag of over \$10 million dollars, or the Oriskany, which took years to address environmental remediation at a cost of nearly \$19 million dollars, the Radford will have taken just two years to prepare, at a cost of \$800,000. The reefing of the Radford is a joint venture between the states of Delaware (lead on the project), New Jersey and Maryland along with the US Navy. Delaware maintains the permit for the deepwater site. The exact date has not been announced, but it appears to be lining up to be just a few weeks away. Reefing the vessel in the middle of the summer will provide great exposure to the project and an opportunity for
